The Sermon on the Mount – Happy Are the Holy

Lesson 34 - 08/10/2025

I. Overview and Core Message

This sermon, "Happy Are the Holy: Lesson 34," focuses on the concept of purity of heart as presented in Matthew 5:8:

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." (NKJV)

The central truth is that true purity, leading to a deeper relationship with God and lasting joy, is not achievable through human effort or works, but only through faith in Jesus Christ and a continuous pursuit of practical holiness. Seeing God is not merely a future heavenly event but an ongoing spiritual experience available to those with purified hearts today.

II. Key Themes and Concepts

A. The Necessity of Purity of Heart

Purity of heart is essential for believers.

- Positional Purity Granted at salvation through the blood of Christ, covering all past, present, and future sins.
- Ultimate Purity Perfect purity believers will have in heaven.
- Practical Purity Daily pursuit of holiness in life, the main focus of this sermon.

B. Purity Is Not Self-Achieved (Divine Agency Required)

"You can't have purity of heart on your own. You can't do it."

- Purity is not achieved through self-help or human works: "You cannot purify yourself by works; you can only purify yourself by your faith."
- Cleansing comes through: "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin." (1 John 1:7, NKJV)

C. The Role of God's Word and Prayer in Practical Purity

- Reading the Bible "You are already clean because of the word which I have spoken to you." (John 15:3, NKJV)
- Prayer Essential for communication with God; He desires that we reach out to Him.

D. The Result of Purity – Seeing God and Experiencing Joy

- Continuous Spiritual Vision The Greek sense of Matthew 5:8 implies an ongoing seeing of God.
- Experiencing God's Presence Recognizing His work, feeling His presence, and perceiving His glory in creation and people.
- Joy as a Consequence Joy is the natural result of purity, drawing others to Christ.

E. Characteristics of a Pure Heart – The Checklist

- Integrity and sincerity no deceit in spirit.
- Dissatisfaction with sin.
- Hatred for sin (Psalm 119:104).
- Love for others.
- Preoccupation with God awe, worship, and desire to do His will.

F. Call to Action – Salvation, Confession, and Repentance

- For the Unsaved Simple prayer of acceptance, acknowledging Christ's sacrifice and resurrection.
- For Struggling Christians Confess and repent; actively remove sin from life.

- Matthew 5:8–10 Core passage.
- Proverbs 20:9 No one can claim self-made purity.

Greek Words Used

ὄψονται (hópsontai) – "they shall see"; future middle indicative of οράω (to see, perceive). In Matthew 5:8, the verb implies ongoing, personal seeing of God.
