There is a distinctive parallel here between Daniel 7 and Revelation 4 and 5.

Both John and Daniel had a glimpse of the glory and the wonder of the coronation of Christ.

There are several ideas about why the word “Thrones” is used in verse 9.

The focus of the scene is on the Ancient of Days, *attiq yomayya*. This simply has to do with one who is _____ in _____.

The Lord is the judge of all the earth.

Now, into the vision of Daniel, which is primarily focused on the Ancient of Days, comes another person, another figure, one like a Son of Man.

This self-title was applied to Jesus by Himself.

Jesus specifically uses this title when He is referring to His _____.

It is no accident that Jesus Christ, in speaking of His second coming, called Himself Son of Man.

Here is Daniel living centuries before Christ is born, and he goes all the way through all human history and sees a glimpse of the Son of Man at His coronation.
