Let us look at hope:

Hope is a word that immediately brightens, lifts, and produces joy.

If all your hope is tied only to what happens here, that is a severe _____.

Any hope outside of God is a _____ hope.

We have salvation, the greatest part of which is as yet unrealized.

We eagerly wait until our hope is realized in the redemption of our _____.

Hope will become reality, and when it does, we will know for sure that the greater elements of our salvation were in this life not known.

Hope then, is the major component of our salvation in the sense that we will only, when that hope is realized, participate in the very fullness of God's purpose in _____ us in the first place.

Our hope comes from God.

Our hope is in God.

It is God Himself who has committed to us the promise of care, the promise of meeting all our needs, and the promise of eternal life.
